NEW PRESIDENT FOR THE SOCIETY

At the October half yearly meeting of the Central Council, the governing body of the Society, many tributes were paid to George Dee who retires after five years as the Society's President. Messages of good wishes for his retirement were received from around the country wishing him and his wife Cathy and their family every happiness in the future.

Following the celebration of the Eucharist by the Society's Chief Chaplain, Fr Seamus McEntee, Mr Dee (from the Archdiocese of Tuam) announced that his successor would be John Murphy (from the Diocese of Kildare and Leighlin), no election being necessary as the two other nominees for president had withdrawn in favour of John Murphy. As Mr Murphy would to some extent be unknown to the members' delegates from the Provinces of Armagh, Cashel and Tuam, he has kindly agreed to our request to provide a brief summary of his CV for this issue of The Sheaf. He writes as follows:

Firstly, I am humbled and honoured to be elected as Honorary President of Saint Joseph's Young Priests Society for a three year term.

Allow me please to introduce myself to those of you who may not know me. I am John Murphy born in County Wexford. I was educated by the Christian Brothers for whom I have, and always had, the highest regard. I studied engineering at U C D and I am a Chartered Civil Engineer and a Fellow of the Institute of Engineers of Ireland. I worked in civil engineering construction all my life, in the USA, UK, and Libya in my earlier career, but mainly here in Ireland on large infrastructural projects. I retired from business in 2010.

I am married to Catherine and we have two daughters, a son-inlaw and two grandchildren. We are living in Naas since 1980 where I am actively involved in parish ministries and also at diocesan level in promoting Eucharistic Adoration.

I have been a member of Saint Joseph's Young Priests Society for more years than I care to remember and have served/serving in various roles as Branch President, Diocesan President and for the last six years Dublin Provincial President. I am a member of the National Executive Committee for eight of the last nine years. For

the last three and a half years I have served on the Bishops' National Vocations Council of Ireland at Maynooth as the lay representative of Saint Joseph's Young Priests Society.

I asked at our October Central Council meeting, and now repeat my request, that each branch should endeavour to recruit just one new member before our meeting in May 2017. Also I repeat my request to members to double the number of times you recite our vocations prayer daily and also to pray for all our priests and seminarians on a daily basis.

Finally, may I ask for a prayer that my efforts and service for the Society, and your efforts and service, may play some small part in bringing about in due course what we all hope for - more new priests, particularily here in Ireland. God Bless,



St Joseph's Society Mass for the feast of Christ the King 2016

Talk at St Andrew's Westland Row, Dublin by Fr Enda Cunningham Adm Westland Row

Can I begin with a little confession: I'm slightly uneasy with the title of today's feast, Christ the KING. I'm sure there are people whose only experience of kingship has been positive; but the kings I know all belong to history, and mostly from our neighbouring island, and to be honest the effects of kingly aspirations for domination and imposed authority leave sometimes a bitter and at best ambiguous taste in the heart!

So how about celebrating Christ the champion? Or perhaps even better, Christ the HERO?

For heroes show us our better nature, lifting us up to see our true potential. Most importantly, they invite imitation. I was lucky enough growing up as a child in Dublin to be able to play on the road. When Wimbledon was on, everyone was out walloping a tennis ball; after the World Cup it was a soccer ball; watching the Dubs there'd be rows over who could be Brian Mullins, or Jimmy Keaveney and who'd be stuck playing Paddy Cullen! Nowadays it's probably Brian O'Driscoll or Paul O'Connell, Diarmuid Connolly or Katie Taylor that sets the kids' hearts and bodies racing! Followers of Irish teams, of course, more often than not have to settle for what is known as the moral victory, when the result doesn't reflect the display of courage in the face of more talented opposition, so that even if we actually lose the match the crowd are still singing "you'll never beat the Irish": it must drive the supporters of the other team crazy, but that's the Irish for you!

That's how I like to think of today's feast: Christ our Hero. ... Heroes invite imitation. "Be merciful, as your heavenly Father is merciful." This has been the invitation of the past year in our Church, the Year of Mercy that draws to a close today. I hope you have been more aware of the power of mercy in your life, and have had reason to rejoice at experiencing that mercy in many ways.

I'm very conscious that not too many men these days seem to want to imitate the choice of priesthood that I and my fellow-concelebrants here today made some years ago. I suspect that the primary reason we were led to consider priesthood as a vocation was because of the example we had seen from the priests around us, whether in school, or parish church, or in our family or community circles. I know that you, as members of St Joseph's Young Priests Society, would share our gratitude for the example of humble service, sometimes even heroic service that we have witnessed from priests serving our Church in varied ways. That is not to deny the reality of anger and deep offence caused by the scandalous betrayal of that calling by some: indeed, it only serves to deepen it. But such betrayal cannot negate the truth that we have had great priests in the past, and continue to have today: such is the abundance of God's mercy to the Church, for which we give thanks.

Heroes come in many forms, however. If people rightly look to priests to bear witness to that love of Christ which shines forth from the mystery of the Cross, a love that is prepared to lay down its life for others, we priests would be the first to acclaim the heroic witness given by you, the baptized faithful. That heroic love is seen daily in the never-ending service of parents for their children or children for their elderly parents, and in those who have heard the call of the Master to follow his example and "wash the feet" of those in need, in a thousand different ways.

I am sure I speak for each priest here when I say that I could not survive without the support, the love and prayers of so many. That is why I am so grateful for your work within the Society, seeking to promote vocations and offering practical support to seminarians here in Ireland and abroad. You would probably be the last to consider yourselves as heroes of the faith, but that is what you are!

I would encourage you to continue to bear witness to our Catholic faith and to do so in a spirit of joy. St John in his letters says that "perfect love casts out fear." When we look only to ourselves, planning our future only with the calculations of the pragmatic, then it must appear, like the apostles asked to feed the multitude, that our few "loaves" will never be enough for "so many." But Christ is our Hero: bring whatever resources you have to me, he says ... and then watch what I will do!

May Christ continue to bless you as abundantly as only He can. And thank you for encouraging us to truly be priests after the model of the Good Shepherd who laid down his life for the sheep. May there be many others to carry on that mission of being bearers of God's mercy in our world. Amen!

This is to confirm that

Cunningham & Co., Chartered Accountants and Registered Auditors carry out a full annual audit of the financial accounts and transactions of St. Joseph's Young Priests Society in accordance with FRS 102, the Financial Reporting Standards applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland. The Auditor's Report and Statement of Accounts are published in the Society's Annual Report which is circulated to all branches.

All Office Holders of the Society (i.e. President, Vice-Presidents, Secretary, Treasurer, Assistant Secretary, Editor of The Sheaf and members of the Executive Committee) give their services on a voluntary basis and receive no remuneration whatsoever for their time.

The only employees of the Society are a small complement of 1 full-time and 2 parttime office staff who handle the day-to-day administrations of the Society and their total renumeration is outlined the Ánnual Áudited Accounts every year. Staff salaries and pension amount to 6% of total annual income; other overheads amount to a further 11%, giving a total of 17%. This means that 83% of all income received goes directly to the work of the charity in promoting vocations and supporting the education of students for the priesthood.

Given the size of the Charity, the day to day financial operations of the Society are running well.

All cheque payments or money transfers must be signed by at least two of four authorised signatories from the following mandated Officers, President, Vice-Presidents (2), and Treasurer.

The Society is registered with the new Charities Regulatory Authority, Charity No. 20002244 and has already submitted its first annual report for 2015. It is also registered as a Charity with the Revenue Commission, CHY No. 1508.

The Society is currently preparing to adopt the Governance Code for Community, Voluntary and Charitable Organisations in Ireland.
